Introduction

Most people know something about astrology, even if it is just the star sign they were born under. "What's your sign?" can be a fun and enlightening question for people who are meeting each other for the first time if you know a bit about astrology. However, in order to have an understanding of the way in which astrology works, it is important to realise that there are many more factors involved than simply knowing when a birthday is. For example, a complete astrological chart will involve the position of the moon and all the planets along with several other aspects which, when looked at as a whole, show a total picture. Each astrological chart is almost as unique as a fingerprint. Just as no two fingerprints are exactly alike, no two charts are completely identical either.

Another thing about astrology is that most people only think of it in terms that relate to other human beings. Looking at it on a much wider scale, countries, cities, pets and even world events have their own astrological charts.

In this series of books about astrology, I intend to focus on a different topic in each volume. For this installment, I am going to be talking about pets. Everybody either has pets, has had them in the past, or know people who do. Within these pages, I will be using the astrological alphabet method to help unravel the mystery of pets and explain why they are how they are and do what they do. I will also give you tips on how to teach and control the pets in your life rather than have *them* ruling you and your household. Whether it is George the cat or Rupert the rabbit, this book will guide you on the path to harmony with your fluffy, slippery or feathered friends.

Pets are a blessing in the lives of billions of people across the globe. Cats, dogs, birds, fish, hamsters, snakes, chickens, rabbits – no matter what they are, they, the family who owns them love them dearly – most of the time. We have all experienced or heard about the day that Fido went berserk and ate the cushions from the sofa, or when the sweet little kitten, usually so loveable and docile, decided that the living room curtains needed shredding from top to bottom. These things (and much worse) do indeed happen but, for the most part, pets bring happiness and joy to those privileged enough to have them in their lives. They are a wonderful way for children to learn responsibility by feeding and caring for them. They provide companionship to those who live alone and several studies have shown that those who have a pet to love and care for will have an increased life span.

When the pet has been chosen, the next big task is to give them a name and this can be difficult. Do we call our cute puppy Spot, or maybe Toby? Or do we go in for something more exotic like Pharaoh or Zeus? Is the kitten we have just brought home a Fluffy or a Cleopatra? Should the rabbit be named Bunnykins or Arabella? Whatever name we finally decide upon, the pet will most likely have it for life and, unknowingly, by the simple act of giving our pet its name, we have placed a permanent astrological 'stamp' on it which will dictate its future and behaviour for many years.

I will show you how the name given to a pet will influence so much about it and its interaction with you and others in your life. Using astrological influences, I hope that by reading this book, it will help you make a more informed choice about what to call your new friend or how to deal with animals which have already been named by others.

A

If you give your new pet a name beginning with the letter "A", you are in for quite a ride, and it will be a hectic one for all involved. An animal with an "A" name is going to want to be in charge, regardless of their age or size. They are an Alpha pet and a tenweek-old kitten named Aphrodite will think nothing of taking on a huge Great Dane. Fear is rarely a word known to them, and even if someone or something *does* frighten them, they will continue to face it until they have conquered it. While an animal not used to the sound of a vacuum cleaner will usually try and hide under the bed, your A-named

pet will eventually either chase it around the room, ride on top of it or stand directly in front of it ready for a showdown, which, naturally, the pet will win.

This pet will insist on being the centre of everyone's attention. If a dog, they will whine, bark or jump incessantly until everyone is noticing them or seeing to their needs. A cat will show their disapproval at being ignored by using claws and teeth to their best advantage! It is the A-named fish which will be the one constantly coming up to the front of the glass tank so that everyone can see how wonderful they are and it will be Archie the rabbit who digs a massive hole under the back fence so they can go off and explore new worlds.

Obedience can be a real issue with these pets too. If you want to be the one in charge then you will have to put your foot down very firmly and from the earliest point possible in your new relationship. This creature, little or big, will take over if you let it. Dog training classes are an absolute 'must' for Alexis the bulldog. Their strong-willed personality needs channeling from the outset or you will have a problem on your hands. Items which you don't want to be mauled or chewed beyond recognition must be kept well away. See to it that your "A" pet has plenty of toys of their own to keep them entertained or they will simply wander off and find something of yours to delight them instead.

Other animals already a part of the household will find this addition bossy and territorial. It's quite simple, really; everything is *theirs* and they expect both pets and humans to be aware of this fact. On a very positive note, this animal has plenty of energy and loves to play so your attention and lots of fun and games will always be welcome. They like to have a space to call their own, too, so make one especially for them. Don't expect lengthy periods of relaxation and lots of snuggles and cuddles because they don't like to sit still for too long. (The A-named fish will zoom around the tank more than most of the others and Atom the Rat will be the fellow on that mouse wheel for a lot of the time.) The dog with an "A" name will needs lots of walking, running and playing as they love exercise and seeing new things and people. All in all, you'll do just fine with your "A" pet, as long as you remember who is the boss ...

 \boldsymbol{B}

If Buffy, Bandit, Buddy or Buster have come into your life then you have just been united with a pet who, for the most part, likes the pace of their existence to be just a tad bit slower than the norm. Although these pets are loyal and loving, they are less fond of exercise than is good for them and, with a somewhat larger appetite than normal, the combination of the two can lead to your pet becoming overweight or even obese. Obviously, this is very detrimental to their health, so it is up to you to see to it that they have a balanced diet and enough exercise to keep them in good physical shape. This is not as easy as it sounds because pets whose names begin with the letter B like top quality food and plenty of it. It will be Benjamin bird who will insist on the best quality seed

mixture and Bella the Burmese who will turn up her nose at inferior brands of cat food. Having said that, however, these pets enjoy their meals so much that they will eventually cave in and eat what is put before them, even if they are not thrilled about it. The trick is to not give them tons of choices. This is not to imply that the pet food should always be the cheapest on the shelves but rather that if you continue to give them the best then it won't be long before they will refuse to touch anything else. Many of these pets prefer "people" food to anything else and so they are among the ones likely to plonk themselves under the dinner table if they are able, hoping for scraps from your plate. If you intend to allow them to do this, remember that it is very important not to allow your pet to overeat.

These pets enjoy their creature comforts. A nice pet bed, a clean cage or tank and clean food containers are all essential. If they are contented, they will usually stay close to home, especially if all their material needs are met and they have a loving owner or family to take care of them.

The "B" pets usually have a nice temperament, but that can change quickly if they feel their home or owners are being threatened. Being protective is very much a part of the nature of this pet so it is a good idea to introduce new people or other pets to them carefully and gradually. Any food bowls or toys which belong to them are given the same level of protection. They don't share well. Training Bonaparte or Boadicea can be quite a challenge as our "B" friends are stubborn by nature and don't enjoy taking orders. However, they are highly intelligent and know what is expected of them; it's just a matter of whether or not they chose to obey your commands.

This pet can be problematic if they happen to be a dog and you don't enjoy having your garden dug up while the search for the many bones they will have hidden over the course of time. Strong discipline will be required in this area but it can be accomplished, as long as you are patient and repetitive concerning what they can and can't do.

Custard, Cindy, Cleopatra or Clementine are highly intelligent pets, whatever kind they may be. Chirpy the bird will learn to talk, whistle and sing quickly and competently, while feline Clementine will do tricks almost as well as any dog in order to gain admiration and treats from the humans lucky enough to have them in their lives.

If curiosity killed the cat, as the saying goes, it certainly hasn't stopped any C-named pets from delving into everything they can to see exactly what is going on inside. You will often find them in closets, garbage cans, bags or boxes as exploring everything is a 'must' to them. They will even jump into the refrigerator if you happen to not close the door properly. Don't leave your knitting or your books lying around either as the "C" pet will happily shred both with equal enjoyment. If you're starting to think that this pet gets bored easily, then you are quite correct. It's very important to keep them entertained; lots of toys for dogs and cats, pretty rocks in the bottom of your fish tank,

seed bells for birds, and wheels and running space for your rats or mice. Bright colours are important too as they stimulate the brain of your pet even more.

The "C" pets have a tendency to be a little bit skittish so sudden loud noises or raised voices will scare them and they will retreat, sometimes for hours at a time. These pets don't do well in a household with a large number of others of their own kind, but one or two more is okay. Sitting at your feet or on your lap for a while is alright, too, but they won't stay there for long as there are too many other things to go and explore. If this pet is supposed to remain indoors, then don't turn your back even for a split second because if there is a way out, they will find it!

Finally, make sure there is always plenty of fresh water around because all the exploring and movement makes this pet very thirsty, especially in the warmer weather. Life will certainly never be dull with this pet in your life, so, if you have a companion in mind who is a little more sedate, I would choose another letter with which to start their name. Also, a word of caution, the "C" pet will leave their toys all over the place as neatness is not their strong point, so be careful where you are walking.

\underline{D}

Your "D" pet, such as Doofus, Dusty, Dopey or Delilah will be a very family-oriented creature. If this pet is able to move about the house and garden freely, you won't find them very far from their owner's side as they love to be around their "special people" as much as possible. Being close to the ones they love is the right place to be as far as this member of the household is concerned. They are extremely loyal and are the type of pet who will love almost unconditionally.

Although this pet doesn't mind a bit of exercise, they would much rather snooze happily with or near their master or mistress. They tend to overeat as well, so it's very important to watch their diet and make sure that exercise is part of their daily routine, even if they are not exactly full of joy about the idea. Dora the fish will spend a lot of time near the front of the tank watching what their owners are doing and Dolores rabbit will enjoy nothing more than watching work being done in the garden while they sit close by in their hutch and keep an eye on things.

On the negative side, the "D" pet can be a little bit sulky, especially if their owners are paying too much attention to an animal which doesn't happen to be them. They are masters of the guilt trip and can make the family they live with feel pretty bad about leaving them alone, even if it's just for a short period of time. Self-pity can be something of a problem, but their delight when everyone returns home again is genuine.

Pets whose names begin with a "D" are almost always wonderful mothers and fathers to their own offspring. The female delights in the role of caregiver and is a very attentive and 'proud' parent. The one problem with this is that both the male and the female "D" parent become genuinely upset when their brood is sold or given away. People who say that animals do not form genuine attachments to their offspring have

clearly never seen a dog, cat, cow or horse whose baby or babies are removed from their care. It can be quite a heart-wrenching sight.

It's very hard (and often comical) to watch the way in which these animals like to hoard things, be it toys, bones, discarded family objects, shoes, socks, you name it, they'll collect it and keep it all hidden away somewhere if they can. Things they feel belong to them and them alone will be zealously guarded from other animals as sharing of anything is not their strong point. Not a good idea to leave the family dinner or other food where they can reach it, either as "D" pets are often just a bit too greedy for their own good. They will also 'comfort eat' if they feel bad about something. They do not lack intelligence, though, so you can easily train them to leave things alone, even if it may take longer than it might with some other animals.

\boldsymbol{E}

E-named pets are highly intelligent and can be taught to do just about anything. Rote learning is an amazing tool for Ellie, Ernie, Ebony or Electra and they will respond with great delight to being taught new things and be equally thrilled to show an admiring audience what they are capable of.

If you like a quiet, peaceful household, then a pet with a name starting with "E" is not for you because theses are noisy, chatty and quiet often, messy, as they toss things around looking for the one thing they have lost and simply *must* find at once! These pets lovely company, whether it is of the human variety or others of their own species. They are extremely sociable and enjoy 'play dates' (and children's birthday parties) very much indeed. They are certainly not shy and will delight everyone with their friendliness and antics. As mentioned, they are easy to train, so if your E-named pet is Elvis the Doberman or Elvira the Russian Blue, get them professionally trained. They will love it and both your pet and your household and neighbourhood will benefit greatly.

An abundance of energy is pent up inside these pets, so you will be doing them a great disservice if you don't give them the space required for them to work it off. "E" rabbits will need a large hutch, to live in and a nice big 'rabbit run' attached to it. Your "E" dog will need plenty of long walks and runs and will simply adore the special doggy play parks designed for them to run around and socialize.

Life is always an interesting challenge with this pet because nobody ever really knows what is coming next. 'Dull' is not a word you will find in their vocabulary and they will thoroughly enjoy it when their owners take the time to sit and play and/or talk with them. They are not necessarily dependant on interaction with other pets or people to be happy as they are very good at entertaining themselves, but the full force of their warm and outgoing personality will shine through when they are being noticed.

These pets have a certain charming, childlike quality about them and it will stay with them throughout their lives. They are a veritable Peter Pan; they don't fully grow up or grow old. Even when they are in double figures, they can still seem as though they are

a young thing ready to embark on their first adventure. This aspect of their personality makes them very popular with children with whom they are almost always gentle. Of course, it goes both ways, just as animals must be taught to be gentle with youngsters, so must the youngsters learn to never harm an animal in any way. These animals won't bite of claw unless they are truly pushed to their limit, but it's far better if that situation doesn't occur.

F

"F" pets are fun to be around; there is certainly no denying that. Nor is there any use denying that they simply *adore* being the centre of attention because it just happens to be true. Fuss over Fluffy, Fido, Freddie or Freda as often as you like, they will lap it up, whether they are a Pekinese or a python. A pet whose name begins with the letter "F" can be quite unpleasant if they feel they are being ignored because they are quite the show pony and will make their displeasure known if others find someone or something more interesting than fussing over them.

F-named pets are attractive to look at, whatever they happen to be and you can groom and pamper them for show purposes as much as you like; they will not mind a bit. They do well in shows and carnivals because people find them fun and pleasing to look at, however, they can also be moody and if you happen to catch them on a 'bad day', they won't be much fun at all and their latent stubbornness will show through. The way to fix it is simple; as I've said, they love attention and praise so give them more and buy them a new toy or collar so that all will be well again. Basically, it's an ego thing and it can be difficult to make them behave if they have decided that they don't wish to so you will have to assert your authority unless you want them to be in charge.

Don't be put off by the negative things concerning pets whose names start with "F", because these outbursts will blow over quickly and they will be back to their warm, sunny self before too long. It is best if these pets are made aware of exactly who is in charge in the family before they decide it is them. They will respond far better to commands from one owner rather than several, so it should be decided which family member will be the Alpha from the outset.

Obedience training for these pets should be undertaken by a member of the family, with a guide book if necessary, because formal obedience training from an outsider will be difficult to make work with this pet. They don't usually make very good parents as their main concern is themselves and it could well be the F-named sheep who abandons her lambs or Fiona the cat who really can't be bothered doing more than feeding her kittens. Nurture is not really in their nature. They will make far better parents if the humans who love them praise them for their efforts.

Gus, Ginger, Gerry or Giant will be nice pets who are normally easy to get along with, clean, tidy and have a pleasant nature. Humans seem to love them and while they don't go mad trying to be clever and draw attention to themselves, they are pleased to be petted and patted and given warm words of encouragement and affection.

They get along well with children and won't bear their fangs if a tail is accidentally trodden on or a fuzzy head patted with a little too much enthusiasm. Although no animal should ever be left alone with a baby or small child, things are far less 'risky' with a Gnamed pet than they are with many of the others. There is one very important note of caution; however, if this pet is ill, its normally placid nature will be vastly different as they hate being sick and can become quite nasty when unwell. It would be advisable for all members of the household to take note of this.

Speaking of health, these pets are prone to bouts of sickness and should be watched very carefully if they seem to be less than their happy selves. Their gastrointestinal tract is of particular concern so what you feed them is very important. No matter how many films, television programs or books show you otherwise, you should never give animals milk as lactose can cause many difficulties. There *are* special milks made for pets and that is all they should have, the proverbial 'saucer of milk' for kitty is a very bad idea. The bowel of the G-pet can also be a problem, so, again, be careful about what they eat and make sure they are wormed regularly.

These pets like calm surroundings more than anything and would prefer lots of their own 'quiet time'. Possibly not a good letter to start the name of a pet who will belong to a loud, outgoing family.

H

These H-named pets are very important. If they could talk, they would tell you so themselves. Holly, Harry and Helena are actually quite snobbish, regardless of what type of pet they happen to be. Hillary the cat will ignore you when you call if she doesn't want to be bothered answering your summons and canine Harley will suddenly pretend to be sound asleep when he hears his name, unless of course you have something he wants, such as his favourite food, a tasty treat or a new collar which he feels befits his status. In short, H-named animals don't like to be told what to do, not by their owners nor anyone else.

Not only can they be extremely dismissive, they will expect the best of everything in the way of food, toys accessories and even other animals. After all, you can't expect them to associate with just any old riff raff, can you? Don't worry, they will refuse anyway. They make as many of their own choices as they possibly can, and if they decide to ignore humans or other pets, then so shall it be.

They submit to being bathed and groomed because it helps to make them look their best but you can forget about putting ribbons and things on them; they simply won't

stand for it. An expensive set of necessary items will certainly meet with their approval but 'frippery' is simply not tolerated.

They are clean, tidy and obedient (mostly) but in return for good behaviour from them, they expect the same from you. A good start would be high-quality food and sumptuous sleeping quarters. This pet has no intention of roughing it, so if you can afford the very best of everything then this is an excellent letter with which to begin the name of your new addition.

1

Pets whose names begin with an "I" are very nice companions, either for a person living alone or a family full of children. Isabel, Icarus, Itsy or Isaac will be loving and loveable. They like to be a part of whatever is going on, whether food is being prepared in the kitchen, someone is mowing the grass outside or the whole family is sitting around watching television. These pets will be very contented and will enjoy nothing more than joining in whatever fun is to be had. Speaking of food preparation, though, I cannot stress strongly enough how much "I" pets like to eat – and how quick they are to devour any morsels you might leave on a table or bench top. They will grab it faster than you can blink. The fact that it isn't theirs is completely immaterial, they have a 'finders, keepers' mentality and if they find some food that appears to be just hanging around, they see it as open season.

This fondness for food as well as being perfectly contented to lay around the house or yard relaxing or sleeping can give rise to your pet becoming overweight very quickly, even obese, and this is very bad for them. These pets love the idea of getting treats but it's very definitely a bad move to give it to them, especially human treats, which can seriously damage an animal's health. There are plenty of animal snacks on the market, so if you want to give them treats, go with those.

Because food is so often high on this pet's list of priorities, I must warn you that it's a very bad idea to try and remove a food item from them once they have it in their grasp (or jaws or teeth.) You and danger of nasty scratches and bites if you try to take things from them, so it's far better to train them *not* to steal food than it is to attempt to separate them from something they already have.

These animals enjoy attention, but they are nowhere near as addicted to it as those whose names begin with other letters. Their pain threshold is quite low, so if they are under the weather or have been injured in some way, it's best to leave them alone to rest and recuperate. They will rejoin society when they are ready but illness can put them out of action for several days and it is certainly in the best interests of the household if just one person feeds and takes care of them if they should suffer periods of infirmity.

This is the dog who will bite the postman, not because they just happen to dislike postmen, but because, five years ago, on a wet and windy Tuesday, the postman brought the mail and yelled at the dog to stop barking and they have not been forgiven, nor will

they ever be because these pets have long memories. They will remember those who love and hug them and they will also remember those who do not, for as long as they like, as they are a stubborn animal and do not give in easily.

\boldsymbol{J}

Jackson, Jupiter, Jessie and Jake will keep you on your toes from the minute they arrive in your home. They are energetic, inquisitive, noisy and just adore having fun. The "J" pet is not for the faint-hearted, but is wonderful for a family on the go who will take them along for the ride.

These animals get bored very easily and when that happens, they can unintentionally wreak havoc on everything around them. Shoes and sofa cushions will be lovingly crunched to pieces or urinated on just for something to do. Lovingly tended vegetable and flower gardens will resemble a salad as they systematically dig up all that they can reach and leave it all in a glorious pile for adoring owners to find.

This pet likes exploring and having adventures, so don't be surprised if Jonah the rooster decides to take off around the neighbouring farms for a bit of sight seeing. Even Jack the snake will slither away if he can and go and see what is out there in the rest of the world. These pets, once they disappear, may be gone for quite some time, but they will return when their new adventures have ceased to be exciting. They won't have any trouble finding their way home, either; it just may take a while.

To deal with the boredom, give them plenty of things to play with. As they are usually physically strong, don't give them anything that will shatter easily or rip apart after only one or two crunches. Training and obedience school are a must for these pets, not because they are naughty, but because they need to learn what they are and are not allowed to do, and to channel their energy in a positive way. As they are very intelligent, they will understand what is expected of them and learn quickly. They are also a very social animal, so others of their species to play with is certainly a good idea. They love company, so one of the worst things you can do to them is leave them alone for long periods.

K

The thing which stands out the most about Kitty, Kimba or Kookie is that they are protective and possessive of their families and homes. Regardless of what type of animal they are, they will not trust strangers easily and new people in their world will have to be introduced to them slowly. This pet is the type to prowl around both the inside and the outside of the house if possible, just to make sure that all is as it should be.

This pet is highly intelligent, very loyal and very secretive. They respond very well to obedience training and to learning tricks but they will choose when to 'perform' and when not to. Excellent guard animals, this cat or dog will certainly let you know if

someone new is around. They are practically fearless and will defend their human family without a second thought.

They seem to be at their best at night, so a "K" letter is a good name to start with for a reptile. They are also sneaky and secretive. If you are looking for your lost socks, just have a peep at where this pet keeps their things and you will find them. They are hoarders, and it can be quite astonishing what they are able to keep hidden. They make very devoted and protective parents but they do have a nasty streak and will scratch or bite if provoked or if they feel threatened. If visitors unknown to the animal are dropping around, best to keep your pet away from the action as they could just decide your guests are unwelcome.

"K" pets have a strong constitution so you won't have many health worries with them, but take them to the vet regularly if they seem out of sorts as their teeth can be their weak spot and the last thing you need is a Boxer with a toothache!

L

"L" pets have a wonderful, warm nature and simply adore their human family. Another bonus is that they are almost always attractive to look at. Lucy the cat will win 'Most Attractive Feline' in the local cat show and Leo the rabbit will have the sweetest, most adorable face you have ever seen. "L" animals love to be admired and petted, but they are not arrogant; they simply love lots of attention.

These pets, such as Lucy, Laura and Lincoln, are very loyal to their master or mistress and will take great delight in pleasing them. Intelligent and capable, they are easy to train and learn behaviour modification techniques and tricks quickly. They are fond of appearing at their best at all times and hate dirty surroundings, so keep them and their living quarters in good condition and they will be delighted.

Dark blue and similar colours seem to bother these L-named pets, so if they are acting a little bit strangely or seem to be unfocused, that could well be the reason why. Take a look around the room and see what it is that may be bothering them. They tend to have a sweet tooth, too, but as giving pets sweet treats is a bad idea, give them something designed specifically for animals, or it can be very detrimental to their health. Speaking of health, these pets quite enjoy having their teeth cleaned, so don't be afraid to grab the brush and give them a good scrubbing, after all, what is nicer than a sparkling smile!

The kidneys of these pets are their weakest health point, as is their bladder, so make sure that they see a vet regularly to ensure that all is well and keep salty foods in their diet to an absolute minimum. They enjoy exploring, especially the dogs, so sniffing around the house, yard or local park is always fun for them.

M

Your "M" pet will enjoy nothing more than spending time with the humans they love. They will be devoted, gentle and obedient. Also, they will be neat and tidy and

keep their toys and other accessories neat and tidy. This pet won't drag their food all over the house or leave thing lying around for people to trip over. Misha, Marmaduke and Mandy can have a tendency to gain weight because they enjoy rich food and tend to 'comfort eat' when they are upset about something. It will be easy to tell when this member of your household is upset because they will hide away by themselves and do their best not to be noticed. Leave them alone until they feel better and then they will rejoin the family again. Best not to push them, their 'funk' will disappear soon enough.

These pets can easily become jealous if a new person enters the household, be it human or animal. Sharing is not their strong point and they can easily feel nervous and left out if a 'stranger' joins the crowd. At times like this, it is important to show them how much they matter to you so that they don't end up feeling insecure. Whatever you do, don't expect them to share their food and water containers because they won't. Period. What is theirs is theirs.

Although exercise isn't their favourite thing, it's important that they get plenty of it because they can be prone to arthritis in later life and the aforementioned tendency to carry extra weight will only make this condition worse. Keep them moving to help keep them trim and healthy.

M-named pets don't like to be left at home alone for long periods and they can cause quite a stir if this happens. They can make an almighty noise and an even bigger mess if left to their own devices so a name starting with this letter of the alphabet is not a good one for a pet whose owners are away a lot as they are not very good at finding quiet, non-destructive ways to amuse themselves.
